**Rites Wednesday For Crash Victim**

Mrs. Ruth Banker Fritz, 32, of 293 Westwood, was killed and her husband, Dr. George A. Fritz, 34, seriously injured early Sunday morning when their car crashed into the concrete base of a warning light at the Michigan Central railroad crossing on 15 Mile road near Van Dyke.

Dr. Fritz suffered chest and head injuries and is at Saratoga general hospital, Detroit. Attending physicians Tuesday described his condition as "satisfactory."

**MRS FRITZ** was born in Detroit March 21, 1920, and before her marriage, attended the University of Miami in Ohio. She had been a resident of Birmingham for about a year and a half.

Besides her husband she is survived by three daughters, Robin, 10, Sandra, 5, and Pamela, 3. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Banker of Walnut Lake, three sisters, Mrs. Marian B. Athay of Detroit, Mrs. John Rich of Birmingham, Mrs. Jeff Rupp of Marianna, Fla., and a brother, Herbert A. Banker of Royal Oak also survive.

Services were held Wednesday afternoon from Bell Chapel of the William R. Hamilton funeral company, with burial in Glen Edon Lutheran cemetery, Farmington. The Rev. Richard F. Jesse officiated.

**FRED J. DOUGLASS**, 79, of 434 Southfield, died at his home on May 8 after a long illness.

Mr. Douglass was born in Stratford, Ont., on July 22, 1875, and after coming to this country was engaged in the heating and plumbing business and for some time operated a hand and factory on Maple near the River Rouge.

A resident of Birmingham for 50 years, he married Marie Marquette on Oct. 9, 1899, at Hamilton, Ont. Mrs. Douglass died last November.

Mr. Douglass was a past president of the Birmingham Exchange which is a member of the Order of the Elks.

The only survivor is one son, James E. Douglass of Detroit.
