Haynes Sewer Deemed Best Porritt Drain

City Engineer L. R. Gare told Birmingham City commissioners Monday that, in his opinion, the best solution to the Porritt drainage problem is to install a 42-inch sewer along Haynes, between Eton and Columbia.

Commissioners approved this suggestion and instructed Gare and City Manager Donald C. Egbert to proceed to make arrangements for this construction. "If this section of sewer were built it would be capable of handling all the run-off from the Porritt property," Gare said. "It is estimated that it would take approximately two months from the time of approval, if given, to the completion of the sewer. "This sewer would be a portion of the ultimate sewer serving the Porritt property and relieving the Eton road sewer by intercepting the east-west sewer as far north as Maple road."

OTHER SOLUTIONS considered were the installation of a creek line in the existing ditch between the Haynes and Holland properties from the eastern line of Porritt property to Eton road or the extension of Torry north to the southern line of the property.

Either would only be a temporary measure and a larger drain would still be necessary when the Porritt property was developed. Commissioner Lance Minor said he felt it important to get something done quickly. He pointed out that the city spent \$3,000 on cleaning Quanton lake, yet he estimates to spend \$2,600 to possibly save a life on the other side of the city. "True," he said, "these are only 40-foot lots, but the taxes on three of them are as much as on a home on a 120-foot lot and the assessments total the same, too."

COMMISSIONER Ralph Main said he favored installation of the Haynes sewer, charging the entire amount to any Porritt developer as costs of any future tapping fee. Frank Rising said he'd like to see the commission forget the larger sewer for the time being and install the temporary line. "We're getting too complicated with the rest of the sewer system which will be needed later," he said. "I'm afraid we'll get all tangled up. Let's forget it and put in the temporary sewer." In a letter by commissioners, Gare's suggestion was adopted with only Rising's negative vote against it. Gare told the group bids could be advertised in two weeks.

SEVERAL RESIDENTS of the area surrounding the Porritt property submitted letters expressing their opinion on the development proposed by Reid-Patterson, president of the city.

Robert D. Waterland, 744 S. Adams, wrote that he is in favor of the proposed plan if adequate parking facilities are provided for residents and commercial users of the property.

Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Mudge, 788 S. Adams said they believed the duplex dwellings a greater asset to the community than singles. They also expressed their approval of a shopping center.

ADDITIONAL approval for the duplex dwellings came from Bennett W. Root, 1931 Webster, who said he felt they would not tend to increase the population density

Consumers To Fix Knox Street Leak

A bad gas leak at the corner of Poppleton and Knox will be repaired immediately, Mayor Dean G. Beier was assured by Consumers Power District Manager Dave Brown Tuesday.

The leak was brought to the attention of the city commission Monday by Rolfe C. Spinning, who complained that the smell of gas persisted from a main near his house at 810 Knox. Spinning also said that the leaking gas had evidently killed two trees and grass near the line. He stated that the Consumers company had repaired the main a year ago and admitted that the main was in bad condition and should be replaced.

HE SAID a week ago the gas company returned and dug another excavation, finding three leaks in the line within four feet.

Mayor Beier added that the city is interested in finding the plotted positions of all gas mains but had no further information from the company.

COMMISSIONER Frank Rising commented, "There's nothing like an explosion to improve conditions, but we don't want another one. We should have some automatic way of checking the mains without having to wait until the residents inform us of dangerous conditions."
