LWV Reports Read Monday At Meeting

The national League of Women Voters Convention reports were presented to the local membership at the LWV meeting at the Community House last Monday.

Mrs. John Runney and Mrs. William W. Williams, Birmingham League delegates, reported on the new program and the two current agenda items which will be the basis of League activity for the next two years.

"The national convention," said Mrs. Runney, "meeting every two years, with delegates from 47 states, Alaska and Hawaii, decides the national agenda. State conventions determine state agenda, while county and local items are arranged by county councils and the local league. In this way all levels of government are covered in League program."

MRS. WILLIAMS quoted from the agenda items "The League of Women Voters recognizes that the building of a peaceful world, on which the security of the United States depends, is the most important issue facing the country."

"The League is aware that our domestic and international problems are inter-related, and it will promote understanding of their relationship."

"Action will concentrate on measures which contribute to world security, with emphasis on international economic advancement and maximum use of the United Nations; and measures which contribute to economy in federal expenditures through improving budgetary procedures of the Congress."

Eight requests for action were sent to the local League, and thirteen telegrams, statements or letters were sent to Congressional committees or President Truman from Mrs. John G. Lee, National League president, or the national board.

All other areas of the national League were equally active. IN CONCLUDING Monday's meeting, the delegates played a recording of Mrs. Lee's speech to the convention. She announced that there are 105,000 League members in the United States, and 100 new local Leagues formed during the last two years.

Speaking of democracy in the broadest sense, Mrs. Lee said, "The League is a dynamic force in promoting the democratic process. To support democracy, the League must be democratic."

"Local and state government is the strength of League work. In our communities we create our nation. "Our Voters' Service is the most powerful League program to fight individual apathy."

The program will be followed by the installation of those taking office for the next two years. Lucille Robertson is accepting invitations until tomorrow, May 23.

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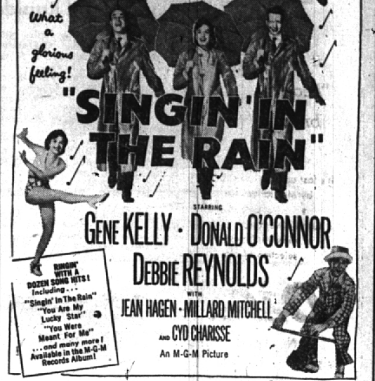


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
