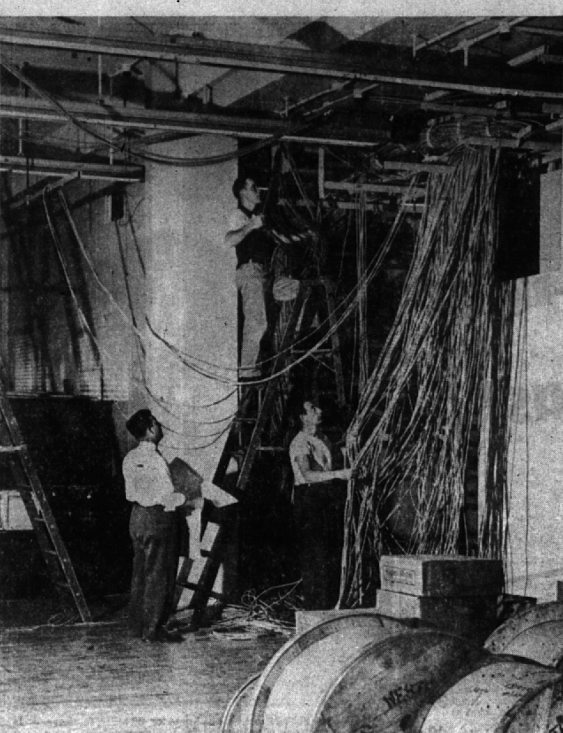

Michigan Bell increases service to local subscribers.

Service Expansion Begun by Bell

With the addition to its central office building on Martin Street now complete, the Michigan Bell Telephone Company today started preliminary work on the installation of more dial equipment to serve the local exchange.

The new facilities in the two-story addition will permit the company to serve about 8,000 more customers here, according to Walter B. Fauser, local manager for Michigan Bell.

An intricate and painstaking job, the equipment installation will require about eight months to complete.

Installation of more dial switching apparatus to take care of future needs.

Citing the rapid growth of the Birmingham exchange, Fauser pointed out that in 1942, there were only 6,200 telephones here. "We've more than doubled that figure in the last 10 years," he said, "and now serve 14,800 telephones in the local exchange."

"In the first four months of this year we've gained nearly 500 telephones.

"Our new building addition is the answer to this demand on the part of Birmingham residents for more and more telephone service."

Hills Architect Will Receive AIA Tribute

Eero Saarinen, Bloomfield Hills architect, will be one of three members of the Michigan Society of Architects being advanced to fellowship in the American Institute of Architects. The honor will be received during the 84th annual convention of the AIA in New York City, June 25.

Announcement was made by Linn C. Smith, 1823 Pembroke, Michigan Society of Architects director and AIA member, who said Kenneth C. Black of Lansing and Robert B. Frantz of Saginaw would be the other recipients.

SAARINEN, son of the late Eliel Saarinen, noted architect, designer and planner, was born in Finland in 1910 and came to the United States in 1923, after his father won second prize in the Chicago Tribune Tower competition.

After spending some time in Evanston, Ill., the family moved to Ann Arbor where the elder Saarinen was on the faculty of the University of Michigan college of architecture. The Saarinen came to Bloomfield Hills in 1926 with Mr. Saarinen associated with the Cranbrook Foundation.

Eero Saarinen went to Paris in 1929 to study sculpture and the following year was back at Cranbrook, designing furniture for Kingswood school.

From 1931-34 he studied architecture at Yale and completed the five-year course in three years, winning eight medals and a traveling scholarship—highest honor in the architectural school.

His next activities were in Finland where he worked with Carl Eklund on the modeling of the theater at Helsinki. He then returned to Cranbrook to become associated with his father and with the Flint Institute of research and planning, developing a comprehensive plan for that city.

In 1939 Saarinen, his father and J. Robert F. Swanson, his brother-in-law, combined their talents to win the \$7,500 first prize in the national competition for the Smithsonian gallery of art building in Washington, D. C.

The same year, he and Ralph Rapson and Frederic James, took first prize for their design of a festival theater and three art buildings at the College of William and Mary at Williamsburg, Va.

SAARINEN TEAMS have won other national and international competitions, including the 500-foot stainless steel arch for St. Louis "Gateway to the West," a Jefferson National Expansion Memorial. They received the \$40,000 first prize. This team included Mrs. Saarinen, Dan Kiley of Francis, N. H., and Alexander Girard of Detroit.
