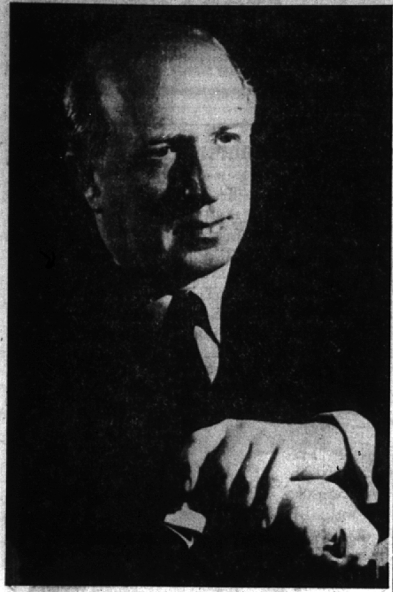

Kottler has selected Beethoven's Concerto No. 4 in G Major for Piano and Orchestra as his solo number. **ACCLAIMED AS ONE OF** Detroit's most celebrated and beloved pianists, Kottler was born in Kiev, Russia, and has spent the past 18 years as a Detroit resident. He is well known both as musical director of station WWJ, and for his Sunday broadcasts with the Chamber Music Ensemble. Kottler started his musical career at the age of four when he began the study of violin. A year later he changed to the piano, and at seven, entered the Imperial Conservatory. Later he studied in Paris and spent six years in Vienna under Emil von Sauer, one of the famous pupils of Liszt. His professional appearances have included extensive concert work both in this country and abroad. **THE DETROIT WOMEN'S** Symphony orchestra was introduced and made possible through the efforts of Michigan's oldest and largest music club, the Tuesday Musicals of Detroit. Open to all women instrumentalists of sufficient proficiency, non-professional as well as professional, the organization is now sustained not only by the Tuesday Musicals, but by other organizations and individuals interested in furthering the enjoyment of music.
