"OUR HATS are off to the United Fund, too," he said. "If it weren't for them, \$59,000 of this money might not be here and we wouldn't be so happy around here today."

Sweeney said individual communities topping their quota included Birmingham, Huntington Woods, Farmington, Milford, Pleasant Ridge and Royal Oak.
