

Delay Approval On Incorporation Of Water Auth.

Formal approval of the Southern Oakland County Water Authority's articles of incorporation was delayed by the Birmingham city commission Monday night.

Commissioner Frank Rising asked that the authority report to the commission on the future status of the Woodward avenue water line from Detroit, from Detroit, north on Greenfield from Detroit, would include the Woodward main under its control.

The commission did tentatively agree on the incorporation articles.

Township Awaits Shopping Center Plan Revision

Plans for the proposed Cranbrook Development company's shopping center at the corner of Lincoln and Cranbrook have been delayed, a packed Bloomfield township audience was told Tuesday night.

Zoning Board Head Frank Arnold stated that the board had received a letter from the developer of the property saying that revised plans for the area were being drawn by architects O'Dell, Hewlett and Luckenbach and would be submitted sometime in the future.

Township Supervisor David Anderson reported that Birmingham School Board Superintendent Ernest Seasholtz had asked Louis Sav-

age, representative of the Cranbrook company, to meet with him and Birmingham Plan Board Chairman Harry Denyes to discuss further the plans for the shopping center.

SAVAGE AGREED to this meeting and also agreed to submit a plan of the entire 400 acres the company proposes to develop. The completed plan, when submitted, will be reviewed again by the township zoning board. The township believes that the revision fulfills the original recommendation of the zoning to the township board.

Few questions were asked at the 20 minute-long meeting as the audience seemed satisfied with recent developments.

Only point of humor injected in the meeting was Anderson's reply to a resident who complained he had trouble following the legal advertisements published before public hearings were called.

ANDERSON SAID that the township always published the legal notices in the local papers but agreed that the township advertisements were not as large as those of the real estate people.

Several local realtors have been opposed to the development.

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Community House Sets Goal, Date Of '53 Roll Call

A goal of \$37,000 was set at the Monday meeting of the Birmingham Community House directors, by Lyman J. Craig, Jr. and Mrs. George A. Woodhead, co-chairmen of the 1953 Roll Call. The drive will open Feb. 16 and continue through March 2.

The chairman stressed that the \$37,000 would represent only operational expenses of the House. An additional \$5,000 is to be the aim of solicitors.

Roll Call leaders said, "and want to have a reserve fund for property expansion and improvement. We would like to see that fund
