

## Lincoln Widening Studied By City

The city commission Monday night informally approved the widening of Lincoln between Pierce and Southfield but asked the city is obligated to assume any that more study be given the improvement before final passage. The proposed widening would call for a 36-foot wide pavement to carry the increased traffic flow now using Lincoln.

IN THE assessment district, shutting property owners would pay 75 percent of the nine-foot additional width from 18 feet to 29 feet, the normal width of a residential street. The city also would assume the entire cost of the additional seven feet to reach the 36 foot width.

The city will also check the existing pavement which is over 23 years old to determine whether this should be resurfaced at the same time the street is widened.

Estimated costs of the improvement has been set at \$33,700.

**MRS. MATILDE L. ROBINSON, 78**, of 721 Eton, died Nov. 11 at her residence after a brief illness.

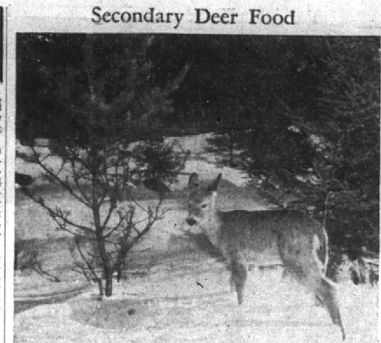

## Secondary Deer Food



To prevent scenes like this—deer stripping reachable jack pine browse and then slowly losing out to starvation—is the conservation department objective in liberalizing the hunting of deer this fall. Either sex deer can be taken the last three days (Nov. 25-30) of the regular buck season (Nov. 15-30) in the northern lower peninsula. Whitetails prefer ground hemlock, white cedar, hard maple and yellow birch. With these species heavily browsed out, deer turn to jack pine and even less nutritional browse. Spruce, shown on right, is inedible.

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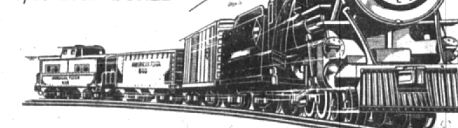
