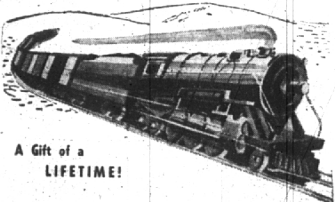

MISS SMITH has received all of her musical training in the United States, studying for the most part at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago. When she was eighteen she entered and won the Chicago Tribune Music Festival contest.

In 1951 Miss Smith was awarded a Kathryn Turney Long scholarship which enabled her to study at the Metropolitan Opera School under the direction of Max Rudolph.

Miss Smith has been soloist with the Chicago Symphony and next March will appear with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.
