## Academy Student Keeps Sculptor Award At School

For the fourth consecutive year a sculptor from Cranbrook Academy of Art, Bloomfield Hills, Mich., has won first prize for ceramic sculpture in the Ceramic National Exhibition, sponsored annually by the Syracuse Museum of Fine Arts.

Anne Chapman, who is studying sculpture under William McVey at Cranbrook, was awarded the \$500

first prize yesterday at a preview of the 17th Ceramic National in Syracuse. Miss Chapman, a resident of Cleveland, completed the prize-winning piece, entitled "Ebon Horse," while taking a summer course under Mr. McVey at the Cleveland Institute of Art.

Last year and the year before, Mr. McVey received the same honor, the first sculptor to do so in two consecutive years. Betty Ford, another student of Cranbrook Academy of Art, won the award in 1949.
