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Skippers Dumped By Maples 14-6 In Running Game

Discarding their aerial warfare in favor of an all-out running attack an inspired Birmingham football team sank Waterford 14-6 last Friday night at Pierce field.

The Maples held the Skippers' great halfback Kerry Keating to a net gain of only 30 yards. Gordon Mutch was in good form, ripping off 41 yards on 24 carries.

The Maples scored early in the first period. After Bob Karch had run the Waterford opening kick-off to the 28, the locals drove all the way to paydirt on a series of 16 running plays.

The attack was featured by the running of Mutch, Donny Dupuis, and John Monaghan. Mutch scored from the three yard line. His kick for the extra point was wide.

WATERFORD TIED the score when Keating went 39 yards for a touchdown. The run was one of the best Maples fans have seen this year. Trapped near the midfield stripe, Keating reversed his field, and eluding eager would-be tacklers, broke loose to score.

The second quarter saw both teams handle the ball 15 times, but neither aggregation was able to penetrate enemy territory.

The Skippers received the kick-off to open the third period. They drove 42 yards to the Birmingham 10 before they were forced to punt. Keating's kick slid off the side of his foot and traveled only five yards.

The Maples advanced the pigskin to the Waterford three but the attack stalled and the Skippers took over. On two plays Waterford lost a yard and on third down Keating dropped back to punt. The hard charging Maple line broke through and Larry Coleman blocked the kick, the ball going into the end zone for a safety to give the Maples two points.

THE SKIPPERS were immediately in trouble again when Monaghan returned Jim McClelland's ensuing kickoff to the opponents' 43. From here the locals went all the way to score with fullback Bill Donaldson racking up the counter.

Waterford could not get rolling again. When the final gun sounded the Maples were in possession of the ball on the Skippers' 17 yard line.

The game could have been very close but for poor punting by the Skippers.

Standouts on the Birmingham defensive unit were end Larry Coleman, tackle Tom Rickelman, and guard Fred Bevis.

Tom Kopicko, Waterford co-captain played a fine game on defense for the losers.

The Maples travel to Berkeley Friday night to play their final game prior to the annual Thanks-

giving day tilt with Royal Oak.
