Fall Season's Third Concert This Evening

The Detroit Symphony returns to the Masonic Auditorium stage after the close of the opera season with its third evening concert of the year.

At 8:30 p.m. Thursday, November 15, the orchestra's permanent conductor, will raise his baton on a program which includes Franck's D-Minor symphony, Wagner's "A Siegfried Idyll" and Virgil Thomson's Second Suite from "The Louisiana Story."

John Sweeney III, originally scheduled to appear as soloist on the evening's program, has not sufficiently recovered from polo. The young Detroit performer, official pianist for the Detroit Symphony was stricken while touring the continent during the summer.

Doctorate Degree Awarded In East

Miss Gladys Andrews of 1013 Waddington road has been awarded her doctor of education degree following graduate study in the department of physical education, health and recreation at New York University's school of education, according to an announcement by the school of education faculty.

Now an instructor in physical education at N. Y. U., Dr. Andrews won a Pi Lambda Theta scholarship for 1952-53. Research for her thesis, "The description of experiences for motivating and guiding children in creative rhythmic movement," has been written a manual on activities and materials for elementary school teachers interested in the contributions of rhythms to child development.

DR. ANDREW'S graduate study is the result of her specialized interest in a survey and re-evaluation of training programs in physical education, she said recently. "It is important to ascertain whether or not we are training prospective teachers to teach activities for the purpose of developing children," Dr. Andrews added, "rather than, as in the past, teaching activities as ends in themselves."

One of the most interesting aspects of her work according to Dr. Andrews, is the opportunity to work with classroom teachers as well as other specialists in participating in institutes and demonstration programs.

Dr. Andrews is an active member of Pi Lambda Theta and of the American Association for Physical Education, Health and Recreation.

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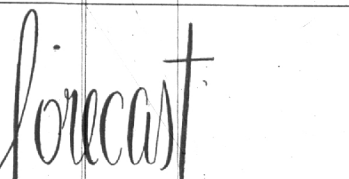
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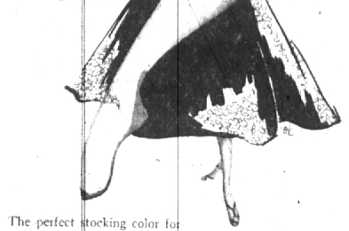
