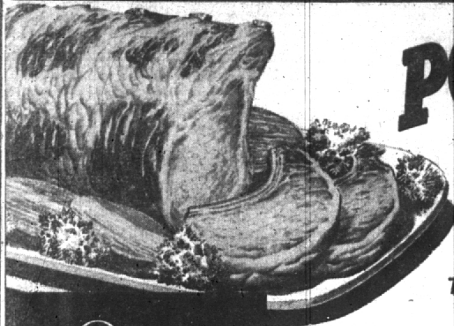

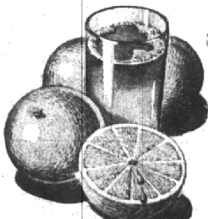

Torch Drive

Up until the year 1949, three years ago, the only source of income for the different charities throughout the Metropolitan Detroit area and surrounding communities came from individual donations. Although the more recognized charity organizations, such as ones concerning polio or cerebral palsy, were donated to quite freely the less noted charities received very little, if any, donations. So, as you might realize, such important organizations as the USO or Boys' clubs were hardly able to survive.

You might then ask yourself why this problem was not pointed out to the people so that they might also donate to these lesser charities along with the larger ones. But, there were two main complications which kept this idea from being carried through.

In the first place, the majority of the people were unwilling to donate to a charity or organization which they knew nothing about. Secondly, the average man could not afford to donate to more than one or two charities. With these two complications in mind some individual, or group of individuals, came up with an idea known as the "Torch Drive". Although the "Torch Drive" has been going on for only

four years its famous motto of "Give Once For All" is well known throughout Detroit and its suburbs. This wonderful organization manages to collect enough funds to serve one hundred and fifty community and health charities.

THE CREATION of this organization helped to satisfy all the parties concerned in the donating to needy organizations. In the first place all the charities are satisfied because everybody receives some funds on which to survive. And, secondly, the donor saves by giving his donation in one lump sum which takes care of all of the charities.

If you still feel that there is not enough justification to warrant a donation to the Torch Drive picture yourself as a victim of polio or a child without a playground except for the street. So I would like to say in closing that when you give to the Torch Drive you are not wasting your money but, on the contrary, you are protecting your own interests.

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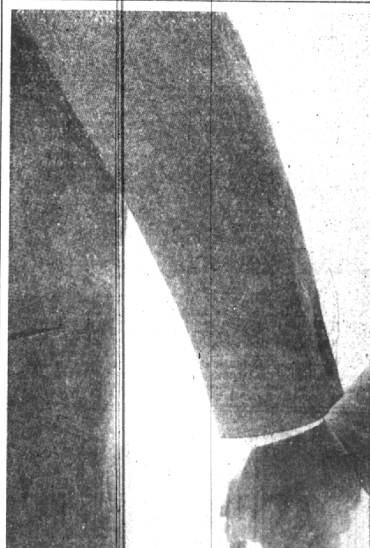
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
