## AAUW Sponsors Financial Forum

Dr. William A. Paton, professor of economics and accounting at the University of Michigan, ended the November 12 money management symposium sponsored by the Birmingham AAUW with a talk on "Current Economic Fallacies".

Dr. Paton began on a humorous vein by lampooning the government of liberal thinkers for their concepts of "social security".

"It is fatuous to guarantee security in perpetuity," Dr. Paton said. "No one can eliminate risk. Even the weather is variable, thus affecting agriculture, construction and even the pleasures of baseball and horseracing."

"Storage can't solve the security of the country because you can't store education, the transportation nor the hundreds of services of people. The subject of social security is not being honestly probed."

Dr. Paton pointed out "a growing economic illiteracy." He attributed the low level of economic understanding to this age of specialization, the complexities of living and the misconceptions.

"We are an interdependent society," he concluded, "economies in a nutshell is the output of goods."

LAWRENCE KELLY, in dealing with wills and estates, pointed out that "Women's Property Rights" vary according to the state in which she lives.

He advised against being administratrix or executrix in the event a woman is widowed because she loses her widow's allowance, has fewer privileges and is placed in an awkward position in matters of handling the estate.

He urged the appointment of a guardian other than the mother in a case of minor children. Mr. Kelly stressed the importance of every woman acquainting herself with the laws of the state regarding wills.

THE THIRD SPEAKER, Helen Hartman, spoke on "The Feminine Focus in Estate Planning". Stating that "Financial security influences emotional security," the speaker stressed the role of women as responsible for the major part of the spending program.

Edward T. Bennett, Jr., opened the second part of the morning series with a discussion of investments. He listed the three major stocks: income, cyclical and growth, in relation to the family investment program.
