## Library to Seek Fund Increases

Baldwin library's directors have voted to seek a city charter amendment that would increase by a half-mill the present one mill levy used for library purposes.

A committee composed of Harry Allen, Merrill Adams and City Manager Donald C. Egbert has been asked to draft the proposed amendment for the April city election.

In asking for the increase, Librarian Joanne Lloyd said the present limitation had been in force for about 50 years, giving no consideration to the increased demands on the library through population growth.

SHE ALSO reported that, although the purchasing power of the institution had increased only 45 per cent in the past decade, users had increased 165 per cent and book circulation, 77 per cent.

"The library," she said, "with increased population in Birmingham is not only expected to supply more books, but has a greater demand of other services, too. 'With more people in a city it is only natural that the other features of a library, such as its information bureau, get a greater demand. Our library has outgrown its income greatly, and if we are to continue to maintain it we will need a larger budget.'"
