

Cranes Defeated In Final Game

On Friday, Nov. 14, the Cranbrook Varsity eleven brought to a close their 1952 football season. They played an away game with Fitzgerald High school of Van Dyke, and went down to defeat 26-7.

The scoring was opened mid-way in the first quarter with Tom Johnson passing to Ted Cunio who was standing alone in the end zone. The extra point was missed.

Cranbrook then took the kick-off and five plays later, scored after Dick Gielow reared around end for 58 yards to put the ball on the Fitzgerald 4 yard line. Four plays later Joe Prendergast went over into the end zone. Bob Newey made the conversion and the Cranes led 7-6. This did not stop Fitzgerald.

In the next quarter they scored on the same play. A pass from Johnson to Cunio who, again, was standing alone in the end zone.

THE EXTRA POINT was missed. So the score at the half was Fitzgerald 13, Cranbrook 7.

The Cranes took the first kick-off of the second half, and marched down the field. They had the ball on the Fitzgerald one yard line when Dick Gielow fumbled on the 4th down and Fitzgerald took over. Later in the period Fitzgerald scored on a flat pass to Perona and a 7 yard dash. Johnson ploughed through center for the extra point. The Cranes had another scoring opportunity when Bill Truttenberg broke into the open on a pass play but he was overthrown.

In the fourth quarter Johnson ended the scoring when he galloped 30 yards on a trap play. He also made the extra point. As the game ended the Cranes were on the short end of a 26-7 score. The season ended with 2 wins and 6 defeats for the Cranes.

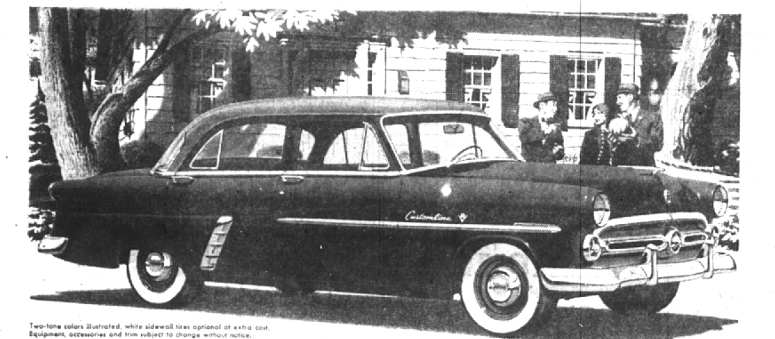
Troy Senior Class In "Rest Assured"

The senior class of Troy High school will present their class play "Rest Assured," Friday evening, Nov. 21, in the high school auditorium. Time of the play will be 8 p.m.

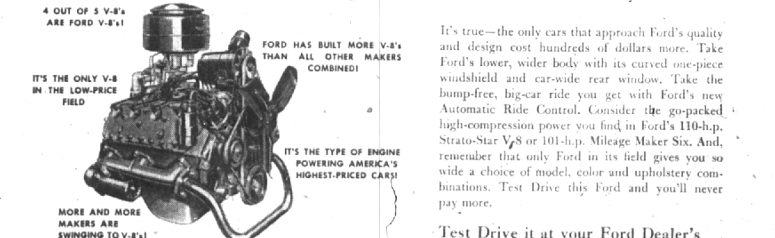

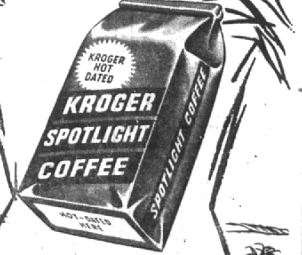
