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Soccer Season Ends For Cranes

A game with a strong Sarnia club on Friday, Nov. 14, marked the end of the 1952 soccer season for the Cranbrook Varsity team. The schedule was closed out with a 3-0 victory for the players from across the border in Ontario. The powerful Sarnia attack was led by the center of the forward line, composed of center-forward Bill Dagg, right-inside Doug Roberts and left-inside Malcolm Wood, all of whom scored. Each of the scorers employed clever ball-handling in scoring his goal. The scoring was started near the end of the first period when Wood got around Crane full-backs Bob Godfrey and Al Rubiner and nudged Sarnia's first goal by neatly kicking the ball past Phil LeMessurier, the Cranbrook goalkeeper. Wood's goal ended the first half.

TWO MINUTES AFTER the half-time break Sarnia scored again. The five Sarnia forwards took the ball completely through the Crane defense and the goal was pushed in by center-forward Dagg. The third period ended and the fourth started and still no Cranbrook score. The Cranes began the final period with a hard drive which took them right up to the Sarnia goal but they could not put the ball in and the Canadian defense held. Suddenly the Sarnia defense got the ball out of trouble and their forwards started a drive which was timed by the third and the goal of the long afternoon. Right-inside Roberts tapped the ball in after receiving a short pass from Wood. Sarnia's three goals proved to be sufficient and the game and the season ended with the ball in mid-field. This game marked the fourth time the Cranbrook team was held scoreless in the regular season of eight games, of which they won two, tied one, and lost five.

Crane Freshmen End With Victory

The Cranbrook freshmen football team won its final game of the season from Mary Lyon's school, Royal Oak on Wednesday, Nov. 12th. Contributing to the final score of 27-0 were George Gary and William Boechler of Cranbrook who scored a touchdown each in the first half. Frank Storey, fullback, scored a safety minutes before the end of the half for the score of 15-0. Boechler and Gary again scored touchdowns in the second half while Steve Easter duplicated the effort of Storey by making another safety. Throughout the game Mary Lyon was unable to achieve a single first down. The Cranbrook Freshmen were coached by James Kelley and completed a season with two victories against six defeats. The season was highlighted by the fact that the Cranbrook Team recovered each of its own fumbles during the entire season.

BARNUM JUNIOR HIGH NEWS

Miss Bette Keller's art classes have been doing a number of interesting things. Clay figures, animals, and masks are being made. The pilgrim figures and animals will be used in scenes and murals being made for Thanksgiving.

Mobles and odd shapes are made with wire and odds and ends. Detroit News columnist Ralph R. Watts spoke to Press Club last Thursday, November 13, about journalism and his experiences as a newspaper writer. He explained to us the importance of an educational background. "I want to impress again that if you want to be a good reporter you must have a well-rounded educational background." He also spoke to us about the record of the school, the different types of beats and their glamour, how experience in writing for a small paper helps in writing for a larger one, and how press conferences started.

HE TOLD US how the trend of journalism has changed in the last five years and that 1200 journalism students graduated from college last year. Out of these, 300-400 wanted jobs on editorial staffs. Mr. Watts has an automotive beat and finished his talk by relating experiences he has had in connection with his writing of the column. "Open House" for the parents of Barnum Students was last Thursday night, November 13, from 7:30-10:00. The rooms were opened at 7:30 p.m. Classes started at 7:45 p.m. and parents were late if they were not in their child's room. The homeroom period was 15 minutes long and classes were 10 minutes long with 5 minutes for passing. Thursday morning students made out schedules for parents to follow.

MISS BETTE KELLER is a new art teacher at Barnum. She was graduated from Denby High School and Michigan State Normal College. Her main interest is art, but she also enjoys radio, photography and music. The new bulletin boards decorate Barnum's library. Book jackets,

featuring stories about horses, are mounted on a yellow background, above which is the lettering "Bide Em." A poster, "Reading is Fun," advertises book week. "Meaning of Terms," a movie, was shown in Mrs. Barnes' eighth grade cooking classes. This movie illustrated the terms used for dry and moist cooking of meats as roasting, stewing, baking, braising and broiling. It showed students how to prepare many different types of foods, and demonstrated types of cookery that can be used.

Two film strips, "How to Prepare Turkey," and "How to Cook Chicken," were shown to her fifth hour group in connection with their unit on meats.

"THE MOVIE OF Daniel Boone" was shown to the whole student body at Barnum on Thursday, November 6, through the Language Arts department. The picture showed how Daniel Boone settled the wilderness in Kentucky and founded Boonesborough.
