United World Federalists Sponsor Minister's Talk

Mrs. Merrill O. Bates will open her Bloomfield Hills home Monday afternoon, December 1, for a talk by Eadney Shaw who is in the area under the auspices of the Detroit chapter of the United World Federalists, Inc.

The program will begin at 3:30 p.m. Shaw, field director for the United World Federalists in Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin, is a Methodist minister. He was recently given permission to devote his

full time to the work of the UWF as a representative of the Methodist church.

Shaw received his bachelor of divinity degree from Northwestern University Seminary at Evanston, Ill., after his graduation from Arkansas State Teachers College. He served as an army chaplain in the second World War.

AT ARKANSAS STATE Shaw won the grand prize as the best collegiate speaker in the state, and was listed in the National Collegiate "Who's Who".

During the same year, he was AAU and Golden Gloves State Heavyweight boxing champion and AAU wrestling champion.

Until his assignment to the United World Federalists, Shaw was a pastor in the Methodist church and spoke frequently in several states on behalf of World Government before luncheon clubs as well as making numerous radio appearances.
