The surprise centered around the record smashing vote recorded both locally and nationally.

The tradition . . . a sound majority for the Republican

City and township clerks wearily cited percentages of City and township clerks wearily cited percentages of registered voters at the polls early Wednesday morning. In Birgningham 88 per cent of those registered went to the polls. Southfield counted 87.8 per cent. Bloomfield Hills had 78 per cent, Troy totaled 83 per cent, Bloomfield township recorded 72 per cent and West Bloomfield township boasted 76 per cent 76 per cent.

CITY CLERKS everywhere expressed satisfaction that the job of registering the record turnout was not a failure. The electorate exercised their voting privilege in almost unbelievable numbers.

Most local communities gave Republican Nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower overwhelming majorities for the presidency, along with his running mate Senator Richard Nixon.

The last time Birmingham voted for a presidential winner was in 1928 when it backed ex-President Herbert Hoover

Birmingham voters gave Ike 9748 votes to Stevenson's 1741. Southfield gave it to Eisenhower 7930 to 2983. It was Ike by 2526 of the 3407 votes cast in Bloomfield township.

In Troy the new president gained 2192 votes as against 1693 for Stevenson. The City of Bloomfield Hills voted 781 for Ike, 123 for Adlai. West Bloomfield township voters favored the General 2799 to 1375.

Charles Potter, facing Democritac Incumbent Blair Moody, gained a majority of over 7000 votes in Birmingham, 3818 in Southfield, 2367 in Bloomfield township, 614 in Bloomfield Hills, 901 in West Bloomfield township and lost to Moody in Troy township by 10 votes.

For the Representative's seat in the 18th district, Don-dero defeated Democratic candidate John Law 9199 to 1983 in Birmingham, 7695 to 3411 in Southfield, 2880 to 423 in Bloomfield township, 764 to 127 in Bloomfield Hills, 2689 to 1709 in West Bloomfield township and 2124 to 1970 in Troy

On the state level, Birmingham voters preferred Republican Nominee Fred M. Alger by 7306 votes over Governor G. Mennen Williams. Southfield township gave Alger 7594 of the 11,556 ballots cast. Bloomfield township voted six to one in favor of Alger.
