As a preliminary to further study, Mrs. Miller stated that "School enrollment has doubled in the last ten years and the rate of growth is accelerating rapidly."

AAUW Panel Treats 'The Status of Women'

"The Status of Women" is the theme of the new workshop-type program that will make up a money management symposium sponsored by the Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women.

Five speakers will compose the panel which will address the group beginning at 9:30 Wednesday morning, November 12, at the Community House.

During the 9:30 to 11 a.m. session three speakers will enlighten the members in the handling of their legal and financial affairs.

MRS. E. D. Y. H. CRANDALL PECK, director of public relations and advertising for the Birmingham National Bank, will open with "What Your Bank Can Do for You."

Following Mrs. Peck, Laurence Kelly, president of the Romeo Savings Bank and former Detroit banker, will present "Women's Property Rights in the State of Michigan—Wills and Estates."

Next to speak will be Helen Hartman, sales representative for Equity Life Assurance Society, who will discuss "Insurance Facts."

The second portion of the morning series will have E. T. Bennett of the brokerage house Manley, Bennett and Company. His topic will be "What Type of Security Should You Own?"

Robert Gates of the Fernald National Bank will speak on "Taxes and Simple Accounting."

THE MAIN SPEAKER, Dr. William A. Paton, professor of economics and accounting at the University of Michigan and author of "Shiraleve Economics," will address the group following luncheon at 12:45 p.m. The theme of his talk will be "Current Economic Fallacies."

Dr. Paton is a graduate of the University of Michigan and received both his master's and doctorate degrees in economics from the university. In 1944 he received his doctor of letters at Lehigh University.

He is a member of five honorary fraternities including Phi Beta Kappa, and is Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

FOR 35 YEARS Dr. Paton has been a member of the American Economic Association and is past president of the American Accounting Association. He has been a full professor of economics at the U. of M. since 1921 and has also taught at the University of Minnesota, the University of Chicago and the University of California.

The luncheon speaker has written a number of books and monographs on economics and accounting.
