

Community House Plans Roll Call; Maps Busy Year

Co-chairmen for the 1953 Community House Roll Call were named at the monthly board meeting Monday.

Lyman Craig, Jr., and Mrs. George A. Weinhold will head the campaign, assisted by Walter F. Skinner and Mrs. George A. Maxsted.

The board accepted a year's membership in the circulating library of contemporary art, gift of Mrs. Peggy DeSalle of the Little Gallery. The House will receive a picture a month during the membership.

Walter F. Skinner of the maintenance committee reported on the installation plans for a new public address system. Board members voted to start the work as soon as possible.

It will include two loud speakers at either end of the stage and plug-in units to permit the use of microphones from a speaker's table for dinner meetings.

SKINNER SAID the Newcomers club had already contributed \$200 for this work.

His reports on House activities, the board learned that during the month of September 233 groups had used its facilities, an increase of 60 over the previous year.

Commissioners Request Additional Information From Model Plane Fans

Police Lt. Henry Timm, appearing before the city's recreation board last month, cited the need for such a field. He said the noise factor had brought objections of residents wherever youngsters had gathered.

Commissioner V. B. Watkins suggested that a number of planes be flown in one location and the results tested with a noise meter to determine just how objectionable this form of recreation is to the public.

In the meantime, Lt. Timm is gathering additional information, including a possible site near the police pistol range, which will be presented to both official bodies in the near future.

Cranbrook Alumni Planning Art Show

Painting and sculpture from all parts of the country will be included in the second Cranbrook alumni exhibition on display at the museum of Cranbrook Academy of Art from Tuesday, Oct. 21, through Sunday, Nov. 23.

Cranbrook alumni from the Birmingham area who will show paintings include James K. Barbee, Sally Winston Robinson, Charlotte Whitney, William Whitney and Clifford B. Best. Marshall Fredericks and Lily S. Saarinen will exhibit sculpture.

Open daily, except Monday, from 2 until 5, the museum has assembled over 100 art works by 64 artists as the second step in its policy of showing items in different art fields each year. Last year, weaving, ceramics and metal-work were shown. Plans are being made for an architecture and design exhibition next year.

A watercolor by Charles Culver of Detroit and an acoustic painting by Robert Reichold of Baltimore were purchased from the exhibition by the museum for its permanent collection, as well as a terra cotta sculpture by Paul Frazier of Minneapolis.

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Historical Soc. Honors Teacher For History Work

Mrs. Kathleen Flint, fifth grade teacher at Vaughan school, will attend the meeting of the State Committee on Education for Citizenship, to be held at St. Mary's Lake, Tuesday through Thursday, as a representative of the Historical Society of Michigan.

Mrs. Flint received certificates of merit, awarded by the Society to teachers who have done outstanding work in their classroom

on Michigan history, and who illustrated their achievement as an exhibit in Detroit.

Among the projects displayed was an authentic mural of early Detroit, a map of the settlement, which later became Detroit, and a replica of the fort, in observance of the Centennial.

Further recognition of the work of Mrs. Flint and her pupils was the presentation of a flag of Michigan to the room by Mrs. Wilson W. Mills, a member of the State Society, whose grandson, "Deane" (Washburn Wright, Jr.) was one of the students, and who is the great-grandson of one of Michigan's outstanding governors, the late Hazen S. Pingree.
