### Side Yard Line Minimums OK'd In Southfield

Southfield township's long-delayed amendment to the zoning ordinance calling for larger side yard lot line minimums was passed Tuesday night.

The amendment, long fought by real estate interests in the township, was making its fourth trip to the township board. Three times it had been rejected by board members because of legal interpretations.

Under the new amendment, minimum total side yard requirements will call for 15 feet in residence zone one, 20 feet in zone two, 25 feet in zone three, 30 feet in zone four, 40 feet in zone five and 35 feet in zone six.

The minimum distance a house can be constructed to any side yard line will be five feet in zone one, 7½ feet in zone two, 10 feet in zone three, 12½ feet in zone four, 17½ feet in zone five and 15 feet in zone six.

Township residents have petitioned the board to protect Southfield from developers constructing homes on small lots.

Those who own undeveloped lots in the township and feel that the ruling placing an undue hardship upon them, still will have the board of appeals to take their case to.

The amendment takes effect immediately.

"THE WHOLE community came to say farewell to him," she wrote. "It was one of the saddest things I have ever seen. Everyone was weeping, and I cried a little myself."

Mr. and Mrs. Rowan are currently stationed in Bonn, Germany. Mrs. Rowan was a former picture editor for Life Magazine at 10 New York office.

### Raises Discussed For Twp. Firemen

Discussion continued on salary increases for Southfield township firemen at the board meeting Tuesday night.

Firemen seek either an escalator clause to apply the cost of living index to salaries or a flat 10 per cent raise.

Township officials, after studying the township finances, revealed that \$4,000 had been set aside for the firemen's newly-created pension fund when it was thought that the fund would begin September 1st of this year. The fund will not begin until April 1, 1953.

This surplus, added to firemen's wages from September 1 until the next fiscal year starts in April, would give the firemen a 5 per cent raise.

Spokesmen for the department requested the township to figure further and find whether a 10 per cent raise could be instituted if the raise were figured to start November 1, instead of September 1.

### Workmen Repair Small Gas Line Leak on Haynes

Repairmen from the Royal Oak office of Consumers Power mended a leak in a small service line at 1919 Hayes street Wednesday morning.

Arthur Bakaleski, Birmingham office manager, said the line was nulled loose in a street cave-in Tuesday night. About 20 feet long, the cave-in was parallel to the new sewer line installed by the City of Birmingham last summer.

### Resigns From Post On Appeals Board

Former Southfield Township Board Member Glenn C. Hagre, unseated by a recent decision of the Michigan Supreme Court ruling out justices of the peace from serving on township boards, submitted his resignation from the township zoning board of appeals, Monday night.

Board members accepted his resignation and appointed Supervisor William Roeder to fill the vacancy.

#### Three Kresge Employees Given Service Awards

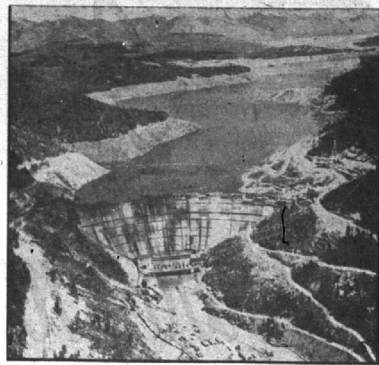
Three employees of the S. S. Kresge store in Birmingham were honored Saturday at a special ceremony in connection with the firm's "Service Recognition Week."

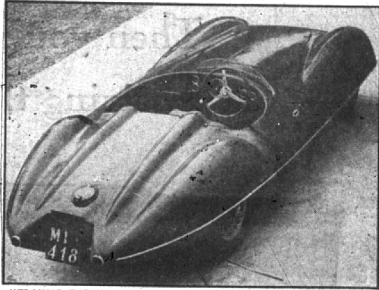
#### Attends Accountants Convention in Texas

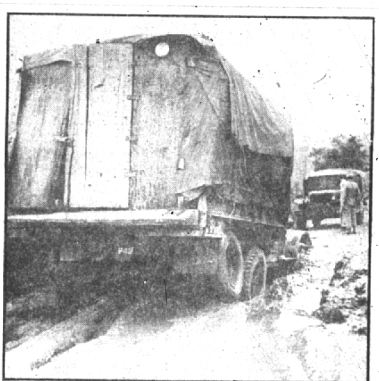

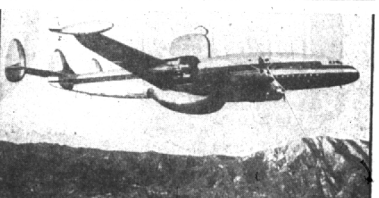
