Books Pour In For AAUW Sale

For the fourth consecutive year, the generosity of an anonymous donor has made funds available to the first choice of AAUW Book Sale stock might go free to the public, private and parochial schools of the area.

Twenty-five invitations have gone out to institutions, including all the public schools in the Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills school districts, Holy Name, Baldwin Public Library, Poniae Children's Home, Baptist Children's Home, and several others, to come this Sunday afternoon to the Edison Company building on Merrill Street to select books, magazines and music.

Representatives of these institutions will be the very first to have a view and choice of the stock.

Later in the afternoon, members of AAUW will preview the books, assisted by the board of directors and standing chairmen of the organization.

NEXT MONDAY morning, October 20, at 8 a.m., the sale opens its doors to the public, and continues daily until Saturday noon, October 25.

Monday, Thursday and Friday sale hours will be from 8 a.m. until 9 p.m.; Tuesday and Wednesday from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m., and Saturday from 8 a.m. until noon.

Mrs. Lawrence Quinn, transportation chairman, and Mrs. Richard Hatch, handling chairman, estimate that close to 10,000 books were taken from their storage place in Baldwin Public Library and several homes to the basement of the Edison company, along with a large number of monthly magazines and other items.

Among the contributions received for the sale have been some 500 or more books from the J. L. Hudson Co., an annual contributor for many years.

ALL THIS WEEK Mrs. Gilbert Gove, marking chairman, and her committee of 50 AAUW members are working feverishly to price these thousands of books so that they will be ready for Mrs. Hatch and for Mrs. Lawton Taber, secretary chairman, and their committees on opening day.

Mrs. Gove's committee reports several rare and real bargains and curiosities among the books; also emphasizes that, while this is a used book sale, many hundreds of volumes are in fine condition.

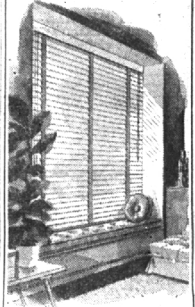
Have You Met . . .
