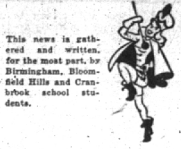

### Cranbrook Breaks CUS Win String By 18-0 Victory

University School of Cleveland's 12 year reign of football supremacy over Cranbrook was ended last Saturday afternoon as the Cranes defeated U. S. for the first time since 1929 by the score of 18-0.

After a scoreless first half, quarterback Colvin Cochran sparked a Crane drive of 85 yards, culminated by Mike Atkinson's 15 yard dash around end for the touch-down.

Early in the fourth quarter Cranbrook marched for its second touchdown. Atkin's at once ran the final 10 yards to put the Cranes out in front 12-0 as the extra point attempt was blocked after Bill Sotter's spectacular pass interception. Atkinson scored the third touch-down on a 30 yard pass from half-back Joe Prendergast. Again the attempted conversion was blocked making the final score 18-0 in favor of Cranbrook.

The paper drive was concluded Tuesday, Oct. 7. The third grade won the award of one dollar for bringing the most papers. The fourth grade and the second grade followed close behind.

Despite the lack of scoring, this was not a strictly defensive game and both forward lines had repeated threats on goals stopped by the opposing full-backs.

Captain Harry Lomason and Bob Godfrey were the Cranes' outstanding full-backs while Dave Black and George Dupn of University School starred in the backfield. The tie keeps Cranbrook's undefeated record intact in 5 games.

This Saturday the teams travel to Pittsburgh to play Shady Side Academy in soccer and football.
