Veterans' Claims For Unemployment Pay Explained

Recent veterans of the armed forces, eligible to file claims for unemployment compensation under the Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952 after Oct. 14, today were urged to visit the branch office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission and register for work if they are not employed.

Luther Olson, manager of the Pontiac office, which will handle claims covering payment of unemployment compensation to veterans, under this act, pointed out that there are several conditions which must be met to become eligible for benefits.

This compensation is payable only to veterans who are unemployed because they cannot obtain suitable job. One of the first requirements is that the unemployed veteran be registered for work and that he must be able to work and available for work. Openings exist locally for several jobs.

Olson also announced that his MESOC office has full information on re-employment rights under the Selective Service Act.

HE STATED THAT the purpose of the new veterans unemployment compensation legislation is to provide job insurance until the veteran is successfully placed in work he is qualified to do. The maximum amount payable is \$276 in weekly payments of \$26 for 26 weeks. The money will remain until used.

Veterans who are receiving moneying out may not receive these payments for the same period. Nor can unemployment compensation for veterans be collected while the veteran is receiving allowances for educational subsistence or on the job training leave.

In addition, Olson pointed out that if the veteran had any credits under the Michigan Employment Security Act, for work before he entered service, he must draw those benefits first.

Veterans should bring their discharge or separation papers with them when they file the claim after Oct. 14, their social security card and a list of employers for whom they worked prior to entering service and up to date of claim.



Play it Safe!

Chimney fires can result in the loss of life and the destruction of a once beautiful dwelling. The trouble is caused by the ignition of accumulated soot or fine carbon. Sparks may be carried to wooden shingles or other combustibles. If the chimney has no fire lining and there are cracks between the bricks, then walls, floors or roof may be ignited.

Soft coal and wood, especially cross-cut wood, are great producers of soot, as well as of sparks to ignite it. Use such fuels, chimneys and flues should be cleaned every one or two years.

BE SURE TO open the damper before building a fire. Over-fueling your fireplace is another way to start a roaring chimney fire. You might expect an oversize pile of wood to be dangerous, but a large quantity of paper, despite the fact it burns up quickly, burns furiously too. High reaching flames snapping at the soot will succeed in igniting it.

PLAY IT SAFE—Have the chimney checked, cleaned regularly, burn the proper fuel in the proper amounts and install a spark arrester at the top of the chimney flue.

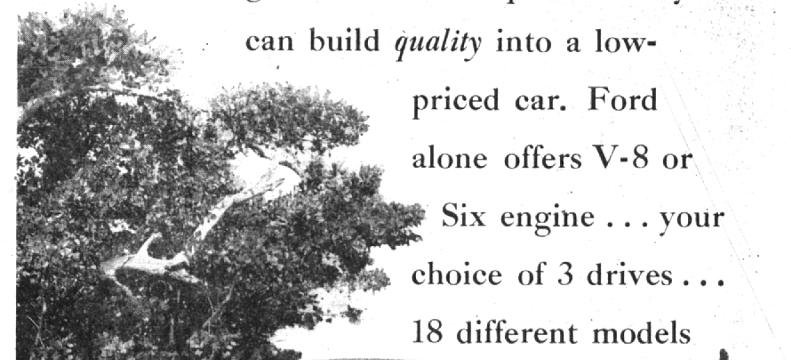
