Book Sale Tradition Twenty-Five Years Old

From little beginnings, big projects grow. From a little beginning, the AAUW Book Sale has grown for 25 years and is now developed into a full-fledged community service.

From reports gleaned from early AAUW records, the Book Sale was a success from the start. Mrs. Leigh Lynch, a former president and still a member of the organization, is credited with bringing the book sale idea to Birmingham. When she first presented the project to the AAUW, it was received with skepticism.

That first year, 1927, the book sale was scheduled to be held in an empty store on Woodward avenue, but the paving of our main thoroughfare was started just before the sale got underway, so a new location had to be found. The Wabash building had just been completed and as the ground floor stores were not as yet occupied, one of them was made available to the AAUW for the sale.

COMMUNITY INTEREST and enthusiasm were hand in hand with the first Book Sale. Tables were loaned by the churches and the Community House and heat, electricity and water were contributed by local companies, while local merchants contributed various services. A "handful" of AAUW members were in charge of the first sale which ran for one week from nine in the morning 'till nine at night. They didn't intend, at first, to hold the sale for that long a period, but people kept bringing books in and buying others.

Of the first year Book Sale, Mrs. Lynch said, "My idea proved to be successful and we made over \$300. We decided to plan for a sale the following year."

MRS. MARGARET STRINGHAM, now with Baldwin Public Library, took over the second annual Book Sale and this time around \$500 was made on the project.

Help from local merchants continued as well as help from husbands and children of AAUW members. Mrs. Stringham recalls one woman who came with a baby buggy filled with books she had purchased from the previous year's sale. Her family had reading matter all during the winter. These books she returned but filled up the baby buggy with new selections for the coming year's reading.

At the beginning for the fourth year of the event, Mrs. William Essery stepped up a permanent plan for running the Book Sale and started a complete financial record. It laid the groundwork of the project so well that this pattern is still being used by each year's

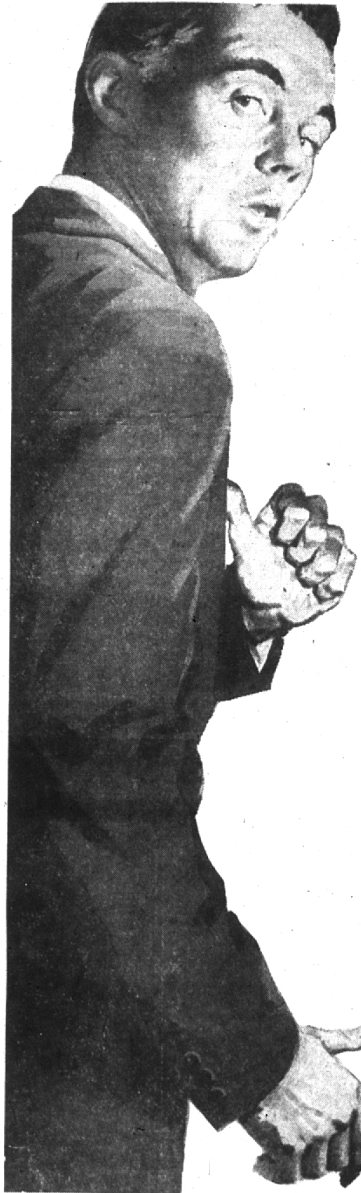
