Baptists Re-Open Nursery School

The fourth season of the Baptist weekly nursery school started last week. Enrollment is rapidly approaching last year's record of 82 children, according to the director, Mrs. Hugh Ralston. She is assisted by Mrs. C. H. Johnson.

The school is open Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 9 a. m. to noon. While it is sponsored by the First Baptist church, it is open to all pre-school children of the community.

In making this announcement, the Rev. Emil Kontz, pastor, commended the new leadership of the school.

Mrs. Ralston has had a varied career as teacher and social worker. She is a graduate of Scripps college, Claremont, Calif., and was engaged in recreational leadership for several years on the west coast. For some years she was employed in the advisory program of Teacher's college at Columbia university in New York. More recently she served as teacher and director in nursery schools and day-care centers in the Los Angeles public school system. Before coming to Birmingham she served as teacher in the Brentwood town and country school near Los Angeles, Calif.

Mrs. Johnson is a member of the staff of the church school of the First Baptist church, having served as superintendent of the primary department for several years. As a part of her special training, she was a student one summer at the laboratory school for christian teachers at the American Baptist assembly in Green Lake, Wis.
