New Bible Editions Presented Churchmen

The Rev. Robert T. Fauth, pastor of the Bethel Evangelical and Reformed church, Detroit, addressed a meeting at the First Baptist church Tuesday night when 16 persons received copies of the new Revised Standard Version of the Holy Bible.

The recipients, representing various churches and groups in the area included Ernest Seaholm, First Presbyterian; William Brown, Christ Church Cranbrook; John Calvin Palmer, Kirk-in-the-Hills; Earl B. Bramblett, First Baptist; Fletcher Plant, St. James Episcopal.

John D. Maynard, First Methodist; Harold Meinert, Redeemer Lutheran; Fred McCullough, Embassy Methodist; James Campbell, Townside Community; Harry Perkins, Ascension Lutheran; R. C. Miller, Our Shepherd Lutheran; Marion Thomas, Church of the Nazarene.

Vernon Fisher, Franklin Community; Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, Birmingham board of education; Miss Jeanne Loyd, Baldwin library; and Everett W. Allen, Birmingham YMCA.

Mr. Fauth told the group there were two basic reasons for this revision, neither of them new.

He reminded his listeners that the first translation was made because the people of 16th century England could not read Hebrew and Greek, the languages in which the Bible was written. The translation fitted the times, but is not

to give us the Word of God in living language."
 Mr. Fauth said that now this revision has been completed and released everyone is charged with the responsibility of reading it.

"WE OUGHT to read it as we read the Bible before," he averred. "We ought to become a Bible-reading people. Furthermore, we ought to study it carefully, as individuals and in groups."
 "Let no one think this revision will completely clarify the Bible so we can read it as we read our daily papers. There is still much that is obscure; there is still much that will demand careful study."
 "Finally," he concluded, "we ought to turn to it again and again, so that the Word of Life in Living Language will become the Word of God in Living Persons—incarnate in us, His people. Only in this way can we hold to the hope that one day the kingdoms of this world will become the Kingdom of our God."
