

Township Adds Approval Maple-Cranbrook Light

Bloomfield township's board has approved the proposed installation of a traffic signal at West Maple and Cranbrook on the same side-the-west. This is previously okayed by the City of Birmingham and the Oakland county road commission.

Police Chief Ralph W. Morley is working with the county's traffic engineer on the details of installation. City Manager D. C. Egbert said. The work is scheduled for the latter part of December or early January.

Being a "school night", their Halloween activities are scheduled to end at 8:30, allowing time for homework, where necessary, and for all to be back with their own families in time for the usual "Off to bed now, Jimmy" from Dad or Mom, at the customary hour.

Road Assessment Deferred By Board

The Birmingham Board of Education Tuesday night decided to defer the payment of a special assessment to Bloomfield township until the next year.

The school district received the first installment of a \$228 black topping assessment for the stretch of Walnut Lake road at the front of the school.

Board members have already stated that the district cannot afford to pay assessment costs for city improvements, but agreed to discuss a policy governing special assessment districts with city officials.

Board members have felt that perhaps some fund could be set up in the annual school district budget to in part, meet these assessment costs.

Refunds Due Residents On Bradford Sewer Line

Birmingham's director of finance has been directed to prepare a special mailing \$183,644, which is the unexpended balance on the Bradford water main contract from Elgin to Melton.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert, in recommending the refunds, said final construction costs computed.

Approve Pump Purchase For New Wakefield Well

Upon the recommendation of Finance Committee W. Griffith, city commissioners have approved the purchase of a pump for the new Wakefield well from the Layne-Northern company at a cost of \$4,778.

Griffith, in a report to commissioners, pointed out that this particular type of pump, although slightly more expensive to purchase and operate than some others, would in the long run cost the city less.

Speakers Mark Jubilee Year Of Foundation

Crabrook grounds were crowded Tuesday as the Institutions prepared to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the speaker foundation.

Well-known speakers and faculty members heaped praise upon the George Booths whose work and financial support made the six independent but cooperative schools a reality.

Charles E. Wilson, president of General Motors Corporation addressed the student body and visitors in the Cranbrook School Quadrangle in the early afternoon. The prime reason for the Wilsons' residence in Michigan, he said, was because of the fine schools in this area. Fourteen members of the Wilson family have attended Cranbrook schools.

Wilson said that a good education is desirable, that work is a normal part of life and that it is worthwhile to understand and get along with people.

In the memorial service at the Institute of Science, Dr. Edwin S. Bardell, Director of Cooper Union, New York, granted the foresight of the Booths in making the decorative arts a standpoint constituent of our way of life.

Dr. Harlan Hatcher, president of the University of Michigan outlined the important contributions of private schools to our entire educational system in an address Tuesday evening. He pointed out that mass education on the public school level tends to uniformity, and that the private schools provided a source for individuality in modern education.

Sitting out the contest for the Maples were Fred Revis, Jim Wheeler, both with leg injuries; and the backbone of the team, Captain Gordon Mutch with a broken hand.

The Maples broke the ice in the first period when John Monaghan raced 25 yards to score after Jack Watkinson had recovered a Hazel Park fumble. Fullback Bill Donaldson bulled over from the two for the conversion.

IN THE SECOND period the Vikings intercepted a Birmingham pass on their own 22 and from there marched 75 yards to score. This drive was featured by the pinpoint passing of Bill Russell and Carle Shelton with Russell passing to Beals for the touchdown. Kamenoff's kick for the extra point was wide and the Maples still led 7-6.

The combination of Zerov's line blocks and end sweeps by Shelton and Jim Gray proved disastrous to the Maples. Late in the third quarter after a successful drive of 76 yards the Vikings racked up a second touchdown. Shelton went over from the one and Kamenoff added the extra point.
