

Maples To Hustle To Stop Shamrocks

Trying to get back on the victory trail after suffering their first loss of the season, Birmingham will be invaded by East Detroit Friday night at Pierce field, at 7 p.m.

So far this year, the Shamrocks have a two loss and two tie record. The two losses were to Dearborn and Port Huron. Dearborn barely edged them out in the last quarter 14-7. Against powerful Port Huron last week, the score at half-time was 15-13 in favor of Port Huron which beat them with a strong second half rally 35-19. But the game showed that East Detroit can give anybody a tough game.

Board Asks Plans For Eton Park

Future plans for the development of Eton Park, the city's newest addition to its park and playgrounds, were referred to Planning Director Robert Boatman and Recreation Director Frank Whitney for study by the Birmingham Recreation board Thursday night.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert asked board members for their suggestions as to what recreational facilities should be started first in Eton Park.

Board Members Rollie Reese and Frank Whitney discussed the baseball, tennis and archery needs of residents but came to no decision as to which facilities were the most urgently needed.

Reese contended that three ball diamonds developed at Eton would center the popular sport in one area where spectators would not annoy residents and the fields could be more economically maintained.

REASE COMPLAINED that parking problems at the smaller fields such as Harmon and St. James caused a nuisance for the neighborhood.

Whitney said that the city would probably have enough ball fields for next year, but added that if the "baseball craze" continued to grow, more fields would have to be developed.

Whitney also stated that there was a great need for more tennis courts.

"At present we have only two courts in the city," Whitney said, "and the demand far exceeds the facilities."

Board members agreed to let Boatman and Whitney complete the plans and gain cost estimates for the development before taking the proposition to the city commission.

Frame Appeals Court Decision

Dudley P. Frame, former Southfield township supervisor, has appealed the Oakland County Circuit Court's decision in the recent libel suit instituted by Frame against Township Clerk Mrs. Fannie Adams and the publishers of the Four Corners Press, Mrs. Betty Lewis and Mrs. Marion Lewis.

John W. Beer, Pontiac attorney, has filed a motion for a new trial with the county courts and stated that if a new trial is not granted in the Oakland courts, his client would take the charge to the Michigan Supreme Court.

The court ruled that they could find "no cause for action against the defendants after a two-week trial in September."
