Play It Safe!

Look at these figures... in 1951, fire claimed the lives of 11,000 people. In the same year, fire destroyed 750 million dollars worth of property.

The misuse of matches and cigarettes accounts for the largest percentage of this loss, 27 per cent. Defective electrical appliances and wiring is second in line contributing to this appalling loss.

Other causes of fire include sparks on roofs, overheated or defective chimneys, overheated stoves, furnaces or boilers, ignition of hot greases and explosion of various flammable liquids and gases.

The fundamental cause of practically all the above fires is carelessness. With this thought in mind make it routine practice to observe the following suggestions:

1. BE SURE every cigarette, pipe or cigar is out before you throw it away. Don't smoke near flammable materials or liquids. Obey "No Smoking" signs.
2. Break matches before throwing them away. Keep matches out of reach of children. Don't use matches as lights to search in dark places.
3. Keep motors of all electrical appliances lubricated to avoid overheating. Keep combustibles a safe distance from all motors. Never hang extension cords from nails or hooks, or run them under carpets. Replace worn or frayed cords on appliances.
4. Don't use flammable liquids in closed rooms or near open flames or sparks. Liquids such as gasoline, benzene and naphtha give off heavy vapors that can flow along the floor 200 feet or more to open flame and flash back to the container.

PLAY IT SAFE—Remember an ounce of prevention is worth a ton of ashes.
