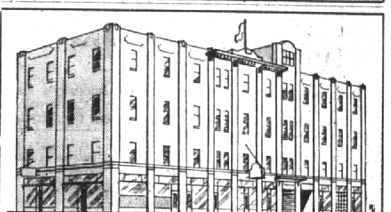
First prize was five dollars; second three; third two and fourth one dollar each. The money will be given to the school's Torch Drive in the names of the winners.

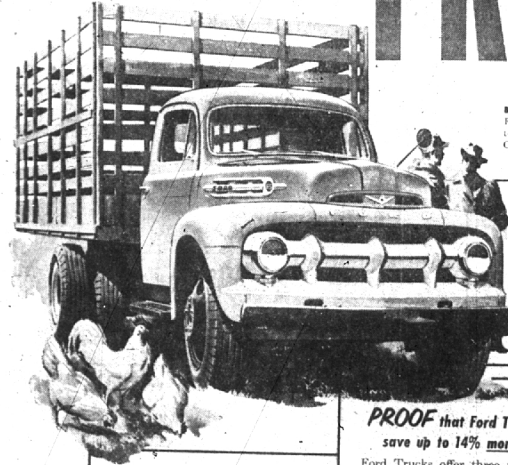
