Girl Scouts will celebrate the birthday of their founder, Juliette Gordon Low, during the week of October 26-November 1. In her honor, a week is chosen to show the friends of Girl Scouting what is done by the Scouts and what they offer the girls of the United States. In this, Girl Scouts' fourth year, the membership has reached 1,890,000 and is steadily increasing.

There are 76 Girl Scout troops in Birmingham with an enrollment of more than 1,039 girls and 387 adult leaders. With the coming of fall and a new school year, the troops are making plans for their activities during the year.

The first major project is the annual calendar sale from November 6 to 16. Money from this sale is used for the development of Camp Narrin at Ortonville.
