Walnut Lake Background Outlined At PTA Meeting

Talks on the school bond issue and the history of the Walnut Lake community were presented at the October meeting of the Walnut Lake PTA.

Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of the Birmingham schools, pointed out the rapid growth of the school population in recent years and the need for enlarging every school in the district to give the children full-day sessions without overcrowding classes.

In particular, Dr. Ireland outlined the changes proposed for Walnut Lake School if the bond issue is passed by the voters.

Construction of a new and larger multi-purpose room with adjoining kitchen would provide an adequate place for group and individual educational classes, lunch room and school assemblies. It would also permit the conversion of the present multi-purpose room to a classroom; the present stage to a clinic and a teachers' restroom.

MRS. JOSEPH M. WELT, whose Walnut Lake Road home with its round barn, Shenandoah, is well known to residents of this neighborhood, told of the Walnut Lake community as it was when she came here 32 years ago.

The school at that time was a one-room building with a large store of the present multi-purpose room. The road was called Switzer road, Inkster road was Tollin road and there was a line of orchard lake roads by which Detroiters could reach Orchard Lake for picnics.

Mrs. Welt also spoke of the early settlers. The first white man known to have lived in this region was John Huff, who built a cabin on Pine Lake in 1821. In 1824 a Mr. Richardson received a government land grant along what is now Walnut Lake road.

An Englishman tried to create a settlement on the east side of the lake where Lone Pine road joins Inkster road. He built a large cabin, but his friends did not come and he abandoned his plan.

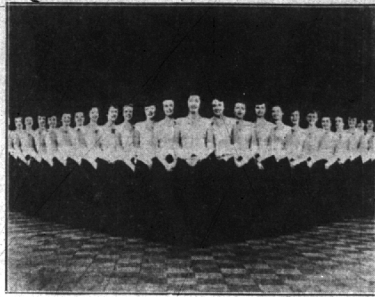
Wing Lake Area Hallow'en Party
