### Liquor Question Stirs Southfield Board Meeting

The long-simmering liquor license question in Southfield township came to a sharp boil Tuesday night as township supervisors attempted to decide whether to issue licenses to two proposed restaurants.

Applicants considered by the board were Ray F. Kolberg, 24095 Tamarack, and the Stouffers Corporation of Cleveland, Ohio. Kolberg asked the board to reconsider an earlier application of his to operate a restaurant with a Class C license at Nine Mile and Southfield.

Stouffers, if the license were granted, would build in the J. L. Hudson project at Eight Mile and Northwestern.

Opponents of further liquor establishments in the township questioned whether the restaurant would continue to hold liquor as a secondary operation after the business was underway or become a rowdy bar.

**KOLBERG STATED** that the owners were ready to put \$112,000 into a good restaurant and said that their insurance was enough for residents.

Township officials deferred action on his application until township attorneys Dell and Heber can report on the possibility of issuing a restrictive license to the restaurant holding them to hours of 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. six days a week.

Action was also delayed on Stouffers' application for two weeks when representatives of the restaurant chain will report whether they will build a restaurant in the J. L. Hudson company project if they are refused a liquor license.

Attorney Joyce for the firm set off a mild barrage when he emphasized that the liquor sale was a small part of the chain's business.

"We have totaled the business in all our restaurants and found that only four per cent of our business is in liquor," he said.

"WHEN THE FOUNDER started the chain he insisted that no liquor be sold, but times have changed and we have been forced to include drinks on our menu," Joyce said.

The Rev. Harvey M. Luce challenged why the chain was forced to sell liquor if such a small part of their business was due to this sale.

Joyce explained that the difference is in the number of dinners they sell because of the opportunity offered the patron to have a drink before his meal.

Luce charged that the sale of liquor in Stouffers prevents many people from patronizing the restaurant.

A. G. Bradbury, 24500 Inkster, husband of former Board Member Margaret C. Bradbury, presented petitions representing a cross-sectioning of township residents who "wished to see the Stouffers chain granted a license." The petitions totaled 500 names.

During the next few heated moments, cries were heard from the audience about "Didn't they kill prohibition?" and "Keep Southfield clean."

Most of the audience promised to return to the next board meeting when the two applicants will report back to the board.
