Ted Shawn and 10 stars from Jacob's Pillow dance mecca in the Berkshire mountains will appear at Detroit Town Hall, Wednesday, Oct. 15, at 11 a.m. in the Fisher theater. The troupe will officially open the Town Hall series of 18 Wednesday morning programs.

Ballet, modern and native dancing will be featured by the group, who top favorites at the summer dance festivals at Jacob's Pillow.

In addition to Shawn, who is considered America's top male dancer, are Myra Kinch, hailed by critics for both her dramatic and satirical performances; Mme. La Mer, leading authority on the dances of all nations; Tatiana Granitova of Ballet Russe fame; Polajenko, formerly with Ballet des Champs Elysees; Ralph McWilliams, now on leave from the Ballet Theater, and Richard Stuart and Vanya, internationally known ballroom team.

Mary Campbell, composer-pianist, on leave of absence from Texas State college for women, will be musical director.

Shawn, founder of Jacob's Pillow University of the Dance, will act as master of ceremony for the company as well as take part in the dance program.
