


OCTOBER TIPS

1. Take in house plants and pot in good compost. Condition to warmth by keeping in closed porch or protected place.
2. Soak well the evergreens, rhododendrons and newly planted perennials.
3. Dig (don't pull) dahlia tubers. Store in dry cellar, upside down. Poor keepers should be dusted with SULPHUR.
4. Cure gladiolus corms in shallow flats for 2 or 3 weeks. Store in cold place (above 32 degrees). Dust with NEU DUST.
5. Do not allow leaves to accumulate on lawn.
6. Work on your compost pile. Use leaves and all undiseased garden refuse and add a decomposer such as ACTIVO or ADCO.
7. When gourds have dried, wash with a disinfectant and then paint, wax or decorate to suit your taste.
8. Mow grass right up to end of growing season to prevent matting.
9. Burn gladiolus and dahlia tups and corn stalks to kill possible borers.
10. Buy your DAFFODILS, HYACINTHS & TULIPS now while a good selection is available.

Highlight of the program will be a short Founder's Day address by Mrs. D. Neil Reid, former province president. The International Institute will provide a program of native dancing and music.


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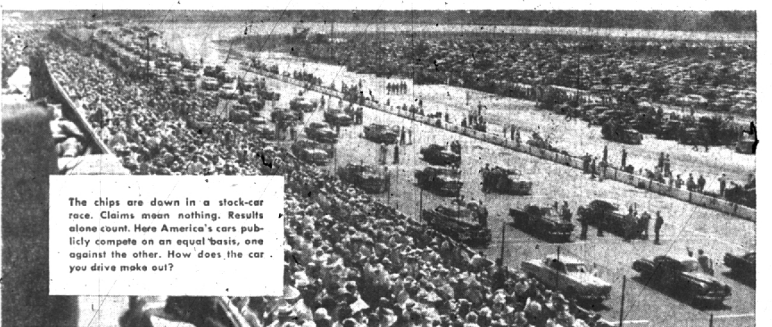
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
