Although a full schedule has been carried on at the beautiful new International Institute this past year, the building is, for the most part, unfurnished.

The gown, embroidered with 100,000 cultured ostris, weighs thirty pounds and is valued at \$100,000 dollars. It took twelve seamstresses two months to make it, and it required fifteen years to assemble the pearls.

The presentation of the fash-

ions is to be "in the round", a technique adapted from the Circle Theater idea. Instead of the usual straight, level stage, a spiral stage will be placed at the center of the ballroom.

The proceeds from last year's show went to the Knudsen membership lounge. This year, funds will go toward furnishing the Old World Room.
