**Bloomfield Hills School District Now Registered**  
 The Bloomfield Hills Board of Education changed the school district to a registration district Monday night.  
 Board members stated that the district has grown so greatly that the caucus form of voting is not able to accommodate all voters at one time.  
 Superintendent John Jacobs said that the district will remain as a single voting district with registered voters of Bloomfield Hills, and residents of parts of Bloomfield, West Bloomfield, and Troy townships within the school district eligible to vote on school affairs.

 A PUBLIC MEETING to inform residents of school needs will be called prior to the election. Bloomfield Hills voters recently turned down a bond issue in the school district to construct a five-room addition to the Wing Lake school.  
 The board authorized the purchase of an additional school bus to relieve the crowded schedule of buses in the Wing Lake and Gilbert Lake areas.  
 A Sick leave and MEA group insurance benefits were extended by the school board to include all employees of the school system.
