Burning of Leaves In Street Illegal
 With the coming of fall, city officials once more warn residents against burning leaves on paved or silted city streets. Any paving or silted street can be easily raised by the heat generated from these fires, they explain.
 Under a city ordinance, passed in 1948, persons guilty of such burning are subject to penalties of 30 days in jail or \$100 fine.
 Fire Chief V. W. Griffith added a word of warning by asking that all leaf fires be carefully watched. "Everyone knows how easily leaves are blown about," he said. "With the small amount of rain we have had this summer, leaves are very dry and will catch fire easily. Burning leaves in only a slight breeze, under these conditions, can start a grass fire that will endanger homes and lives. Extra care of all fires in the heat insurance anyone can have."

Well Approved For Walnut School
 Lack of water pressure at the Walnut Lake school will be remedied as soon as a new six inch well can be drilled on the school property.
 The lowering of the static water table at the school has reduced the pumpage of the present well to 425 gallons per hour.
 The Birmingham Board of Education received a report from the engineers that a new well would not only produce adequate water pressure for school use of water but would also insure a sufficient supply of water for fire protection. Estimated cost of the new well was set at \$1,850.

 Sealed bids for the purchase of tax delinquent notes of the School District of the City of Birmingham, Oakland County, Michigan, of the year value of \$39,000, will be received by the undersigned at the office of the Board of Education of said School District, corner of Charing and Martin Streets, in the City of Birmingham, Michigan, until 3:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on Friday, the 25th day of September, 1952, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read. The notes will be dated September 1, 1951 and will mature February 1, 1952, and will bear interest at a rate not to exceed 7 1/2 per annum. Both principal and interest shall be payable at the Birmingham National Bank in the City of Birmingham, Michigan. Denominations of the notes shall be at the option of the purchaser. Each bid shall state in submitted expressed in multiple of \$100. The annual interest rate upon which the purchaser at the time of delivery of the notes shall be paid by the notes are to be issued in anticipation of the collection of the 1952 operating taxes.
 For the purpose of awarding the notes the interest rate of each bid will be specified herein the total dollar value of all interest to be deducted from the notes upon maturity and deduction of all interest premium.
