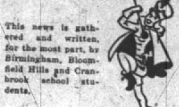
QUEEN MARJORIE CROOK REIGNED

The contest is the first of the season for both teams and will mark the first time that Birmingham has participated in an athletic contest as a class A school. It is also the first meeting between these two schools.

A class-B outfit, Romulus lost only one game over the past four years and pre-season dope has it that they will be hard to beat again this season.

The Maples' main task will be to stop Romulus's two giant ends who tower six feet nine and six feet five.

The Maroon offensive setup will follow the same pattern as in previous years, with the plays starting from an unbalanced T formation and then switching into the single wing on the other hand, Romulus will employ the fast-moving split T this year, with emphasis on passing and quick opening plays.

Maple Coach Vincent Serentino said that his team will go into the game with a few surprises to spring in hopes of stopping the speedy Romulus eleven and ending their impressive winning streak.
