The medium of exchange is the Antique Show, sponsored annually by the Piety Hill chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Interest is already mounting in the plans for the second annual show, to be held October 1-2 at the Community House.

AS IN OTHER years, funds will go to national DAR sponsored activities; historical, educational and patriotic.

PIETY HILL' is only one of the antique show funds last year.

A scholarship and gift window for the Tennessee school in South Carolina's Blue Ridge mountains was made possible.

These two institutions in the South are owned and operated by the national DAR. They were founded to give education facilities to young people who cannot afford to attend other schools and colleges where costs are higher.

Another grant went to the Valley Forge Memorial fund where the DAR is constructing a memorial bell tower.

Also benefitting were the School for Indians fund and the Veterans' Magazine Subscription fund.

OF PARTICULAR interest to local members is another grant from last year's proceeds.

The balance of the proceeds will be used as a nucleus to finance the start of this year's show.
