

Commission OK's Lincoln Sidewalk

Construction of a sidewalk on the north side of Lincoln avenue from Gulfview to Southfield, wherever side walk does not presently exist, has been ordered by Birmingham city commissioners.

During the week of Sept. 7-13, the Birmingham police department took a pedestrian and vehicular traffic count on Lincoln, west of Southfield.

Need for the sidewalk was indicated by the survey.

Several weeks ago, when the commission originally considered the sidewalk construction, abutting property owners asked that a survey be taken in an effort to determine the potential use of the walk.

At Monday's hearing, no one arose to oppose its installation.
