Troy township's liquor committee Monday night recommended approval of two tavern license applications to the township board.

APPLICANTS had requested Class C licenses, but the liquor committee recommended that new licenses be restricted to tavern use. Township Clerk Clifton Truesdell set Monday, Oct. 20 as the date for the public hearing.
