

Red Cross Seeks Volunteer Help

Your Red Cross needs volunteers. It needs them right now and lots of them. Gray Ladies, staff and social welfare aides, and drivers for motor service.

That's the conclusion of a recent conference of various program chairmen of Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross at the chapter's Pontiac office.

Attending the meeting were P. Mack Smith and Mrs. George McCormick, Jr. of Birmingham, chairmen of water safety and welfare aides, respectively; Ralph S. Forman, Mrs. John D. Monroe and Mrs. J. C. Walker of Pontiac, chairmen of first aid, blood program and volunteer services; Mrs. P. S. Johnson of Pleasant Ridge, home service chairman; and Gar A. Swezey of Royal Oak, fund campaign chairman.

CITING THE urgent need for more Gray Ladies, Mrs. Walker commented that volunteers are now taking over staff jobs at Dearborn Veterans' hospital. The expanded volunteer program needs staff aides, too, to help keep records and do other office work. Mrs. McCormick urged that people who have had training or experience in social work, psychology or allied fields—and who can give one day of service each week—do so now.

Both commented that drivers are still needed in motor service, too, to transport chapter supplies, drive volunteers and donors to and from blood "clinics" and keep the Red Cross' wheels rolling. Those who can serve, are asked to contact Red Cross headquarters in Royal Oak or Pontiac.

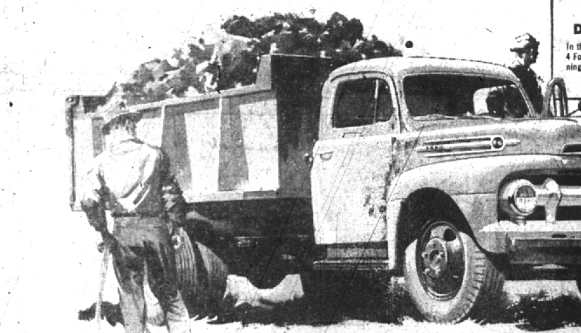
