

## AAUW Values Reviewed; Two Donations Revealed

Birmingham's American Association of University Women met for the first fall luncheon and meeting at the Bloomfield Hills country club on Sept. 17, with 160 present.

Guest speaker, Mrs. Ralph B. Alspaugh of Cincinnati, Ohio, AAUW regional vice-president, was introduced by Mrs. Edward W. McCaul, program chairman.

Mrs. Alspaugh, who has been making a lecture tour through Michigan, welcomed new members of the local branch and the 30 visiting members from Monroe, Detroit, Flint, Dearborn, Oakland and Pontiac. Mrs. E. H. Bechtold, president of the Flint association sat at the speaker's table.

Mrs. Alspaugh stressed that "intelligence without spiritual background is worth nothing at all."

She emphasized that the AAUW finds its great value as an organization lies in its combination of spiritual and intellectual aims.

"They are a counterpart of one another," Mrs. Alspaugh observed. "Education being one of the main interests of AAUW, she urged that members seek out new graduates as potential teachers. She pointed out that there is a need for 150,000 new school teachers and that it is the duty and desire of AAUW to help solve this problem.

"AN IMPORTANT work that is being aided by AAUW, according to Mrs. Alspaugh, is the claim of time and stations on television for educational purposes. This valuable study is being pursued in conjunction with the FCC. Although, mass education by means of television is being attempted in localities where teachers are most scarce, she pointed out, a problem confronting many small colleges and universities is
