Board Rules Out The Thermometer To Close School

Janitors in Birmingham schools have made the rounds of school room thermometers at the request of Superintendent Dwight B. Ireland.

One alarmed resident had rebooked Ireland for keeping the children in school as outdoor temperatures soared into the nineties, and Ireland made a check of the heat in all the schools.

First checks were made at the glass-walled new high school where criticisms have been aimed because of too much glass and sun for comfort. Temperatures in the high school rooms were found to range between 86 degrees and 92 degrees.

THE TEMPERATURE range in Quinton, Pierce and Torry was between 84 and 90 with children in Quinton enjoying the weather heat with lowest temperatures of 83 to 86 degrees.

The complaining party contended that it was cruel to make the children attend school when the thermometer reached the nineties and suggested that Ireland dismiss all classes whenever the 90 degree mark was hit.

Board members agreed with Ireland that possibly one of the

best places for children in the hottest weather was in school where they could be kept quiet.

They also agreed that it would be a difficult problem to interrupt classes every time the temperature reached a certain degree.

WE HEARD IT SAID BY—
MALCOLM FERGUSON, Pierce school principal: "We had our first fire drills here last week and it surprised me how quickly and quietly those youngsters left the building. There are more than eight hundred here this year, and they filed out with no fuss at all. We even had a few parents visiting the school who went along with the drill."
