### Radio, Television Celebrity To Be Guest of Pierce PTA

Fran Harris, Women's editor of WWJ, will be the guest speaker at the next regular meeting of the Pierce PTA, eight o'clock Thursday evening, April 16, at the school.

Mrs. Harris, a graduate of Highland Park high school and Grinnell College, Grinnell, Iowa, has a number of radio and television "bits" to her name, being the first woman in Michigan to appear on television. The program started during the last war brought her

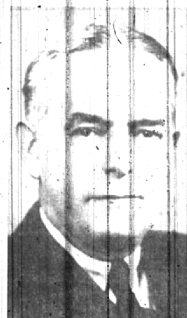
before the microphones as the first woman to give routine newscasts in 1943.

HER RADIO awards include the Alfred Sloan safety award for "Turnabout" and "Junior Judge," both programs with school children; the George Foster Peabody award for "Protect Your Child," the Automobile Club of Michigan award for child safety shows; and the Theta Sigma Chi award for the outstanding woman in Journalism in Michigan.

In 1946 Mrs. Harris was named a "Woman of Achievement" in Detroit's 25th anniversary celebration. She is a member of the Metropolitan YWCA publicity committee, Scout Troop Committee, Group Recreation Board, Adult Education Board, Michigan Society for Mental Hygiene Board, and the Detroit Council Community Nursing Publicity Committee.

Mrs. Harris has received citations from the American War Ambulance, National Conference of Christians and Jews, Metropolitan Detroit United Foundation, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and Detroit Junior Board of Commerce Auxiliary.

IN PRIVATE life Mrs. Harris is the wife of Hugh W. Harris and mother of daughter, Pat, 16, and sons, Bill, 11, and Bob, 9.
