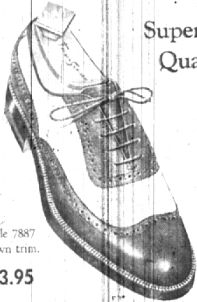

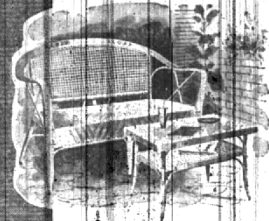

Congregational Services

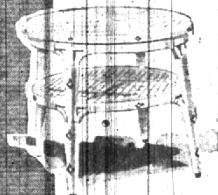
