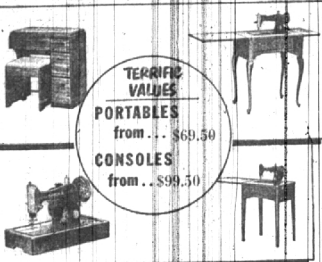


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Mid-April Workshop Shows 'How The Garden Doth Grow'

The Workshop is sponsored by the Women's National Farm and Garden Association, Inc., in cooperation with the cooperative extension service of Michigan State College.

The two-day workshop is open to anyone who wishes to learn more about growing bigger and better flowers.

THURSDAY, April 16, will be devoted to talks and demonstrations about planning and planting the flower garden. Morning topics will include the selection of a garden site, methods of improving soils and fertilizers.

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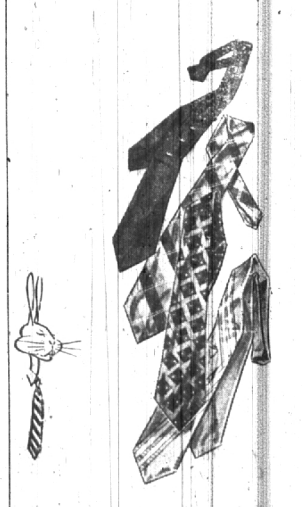
